


Education Tax Rate = Spending per Student


Student population Same Building Fewer Kids? becoming more advantaged?








Student Population Decline




Education Spending and Enrollment




Homelessness is a Problem of Unhousable People

Homelessness is a housing problem

Housing affordability and supply, not substance use, mental illness, poverty, climate, local political context, availability of services, account for regional variation in homelessness.

In Vermont, the Fair Market Rent (FMR) for a two-bedroom apartment is \$1,328. In order to afford this level of rent and utilities — without paying more than 30% of income on housing — a household must earn \$4,426 monthly or \$53,117 annually. Assuming a 40-hour work week, 52 weeks per year, this level of income translates into an hourly Housing Wage of:






Myth 2: Homelessness is Complex and Unsolvable


Proven Solutions

Decades of research show that the vast majority of people experiencing homelessness, including those with severe mental illness, significant encounters with the criminal justice system, and substance use disorder, can be successfully housed using a Housing First approach.

Many commonly employed approaches not backed by evidence

Real World Progress

Cities employing evidence-based solutions solutions at scale—Houston, Milwaukee—making progress.



Myth 3:

Homelessness is not a Vermont Problem

- Second highest per capita rate of homelessness in the US in 2022, 18.5% increase in 2023.
- Homelessness has been largely invisible: manifests as couchsurfing, doubling up, living in cars.
- More than 80% of Vermonters experiencing homelessness sheltered in motels prior to summer 2023.3
- Most Vermonters experiencing homelessness are from Vermont.



Myth 4: Homelessness is too costly to solve

Homelessness imposes steep costs and impacts on communities

Cost of unsheltered homeless—upwards of \$30,000 per year. 1,2,3,4

Costs absorbed by health system, schools, criminal justice system, public services, and municipalities.

Unsheltered homelessness is resource intensive for communities: 90% of costs absorbed by municipalities; most costs not supported by HUD funding

ABSTRACT

Background Homelessness is believed to be a cause of health problems and high medical costs, but data supporting this association have been difficult to obtain. We compared lengths of stay and reasons for hospital admission among homeless and other low-income persons in New York City to estimate the hospitalization costs associated with homelessness.

INCE the early 1980s, homelessness has been an intractable problem in the nation's largest cities. Some observers trace the growth of homelessness largely to the social policies of the 1970s, including the deinstitutionalization of the mentally ill and the dismantling of government-sponsored housing and social-services programs for the poor. In more recent years, questions have been raised about whether the many public resourc-


